Dear Friends

Deployment update

Hi everyone, and Happy New Year to those I haven't been able to talk to recently. Thank you to those who keep asking if I have recovered from shingles and I am glad to say that "yes" I believe so. However there is no disguising the fact that the coming months and years will bring upheaval and turmoil to us all, perhaps me more than most.

Whilst I was off sick in September, we held a joint pastorate church meeting to discuss the Synod request for all ministers to offer 25-30% of their time to a church currently without ministry, for a period of up to 2 years, until a more permanent resolution can be found. Thank you everyone for supporting me in my belief that as part of a greater calling of "the priesthood of all believers" that those who have should share with those who do not. The current projection is that by this coming September, 41% of churches in NM Synod will be without a minister.

I can now confirm to folk that (as I had suggested) I have now been paired with the good folk at Wilbraham St Ninians in Chorlton for my 25 - 30% of ministerial cover. Many of you will know that over the last couple of years I have actually been their "Interim Moderator" so I know them, and they know me and we in effect asked for each other.

WsN is a very unusual church (and it is this which attracted me to them) in that they have 2 separate congregations. The first I think would be recognisable to most as a traditional URC Sunday morning congregation with close community relationships. The afternoon congregation consists of the former Metropolitan Church that is primarily LGBT folk. They are largely refugees and asylum seekers who have left home around the world because of persecution.

However there is no disguising that 2 congregations, each with their own service will add significantly to my Sunday Service pattern – with a standard rota of 9~10 services every month which is perhaps double the usual number. In addition, just being there for such a fragile community will require all the pastoral skills that I can muster.

There is no doubt that this is the start of a period which will see Bramhall and Cheadle Hulme moving from a 2 to a 3 church pastorate (though I cannot guarantee what the final configuration will be), and we will all have to flexible and forgiving in the months ahead as I reduce the time I have for my existing churches. Synod have asked the churches to identify areas of work which can be released and it is my view that whilst some can be identified now, others may have to be

reviewed as the practice, rather than the theory takes over.

The young man Samuel heard God's voice calling him and perhaps this is a time when we all have to open our spiritual ears to hear what God has to say to us and say as Samuel said, "Hear I am Lord, send me".

The February meeting will be held on 1 FEB at my home.



WORTH HER WEIGHT IN £ & P

The much-loved novelist **JANE AUSTEN** is about to make history. 200 years after her death, she will appear simultaneously on a British coin **and** a British bank note. That means that only the Queen, who as head of state must be depicted on British currency, will be more prevalent.

The Royal Mint has chosen Jane Austen as the new image for its commemorative £2 coin. About five million will be released into mass circulation sometime this Spring. At about the same time, the Bank of England will release its new, plastic, un-rippable £10 note, with Jane Austen replacing Charles Darwin.

Historians cannot recall the last time a figure other than the reigning monarch appeared on both coins and notes at the same time. The release of both coins and notes will be in step with the 200th anniversary of Jane Austen's death, in the summer of 1817, at the age of just 41.

THE BALFOUR DECLARATION

In November 1917 the government of Britain issued the Balfour Declaration which promised a homeland for the Jewish people in Palestine whilst also promising to protect the rights of the existing indigenous Arab population. However, in 1915 Britain had already promised the Arabs that after the war they would be granted independence in their lands, including Palestine. The Balfour declaration stated that the British Government viewed with favour:-

"the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people, and will use their best endeavours to facilitate the achievement of this object, it being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine, ..."

In 1947 the UN passed the resolution on the Partition Plan for Israel and Palestine. Following the Arab/Israeli war in 1967 Israel occupied the West Bank. Currently, the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) report that in 2016 the Israeli authorities demolished or seized 1,089 Palestinian-owned structures throughout the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, displacing 1,593 Palestinians. These are the highest West Bank demolition and displacement figures since OCHA started recording in 2009.

Consequently it is argued that the latter part of the Balfour Declaration regarding the rights of the existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine has yet to be satisfied. For some the Balfour declaration represents an important step in the self determination of the Jewish people. Israel's Ambassador has called for a public celebration of the anniversary while the UK Government has said only that it will be "marked with pride" Meanwhile for Palestinians the Balfour Declaration is a matter of profound regret.

Various events are being planning in 2017 to mark 100 years since the Balfour Declaration and 50 years of military occupation including a walk to Jerusalem in June For more on the history of the Balfour Declaration see http://www.balfourproject.org/

WALKING

Saturday 13 February: A larger than normal group gathered and we travelled to Castleton in Derbyshire to meet up with another group of walkers from the Northern College, comprising staff, students and some former students. Most of the high ground was shrouded in heavy mist so those going for the first time missed seeing the spectacular views that are available from Mam Tor and the ridge.

CHURCH WITHOUT WALLS

Ruth Maxey moved to Milton Keynes in 2013 to pioneer a new kind of church. Three and a half years later, she leads a thriving worshipping community – and still has no church building.



Recently at Talking Point, a weekly meeting where our church has tea and cake and talks about life, someone said they thought the group had met without them. I explained they hadn't – one of them had had an Ann Summers party and invited her church friends. That just wouldn't happen at a normal church, but it's how it is at Church Without Walls – refreshingly different!

I began Church Without Walls when I came to Milton Keynes in the summer of 2013. My word, it was daunting to start this from scratch, but exciting. We started a monthly

Cafe Church, with discussion over coffee and croissants. We added Dinner Church on another Sunday, with communion and a meal and a talk. In 2015 we started a third monthly gathering, Forest Church, which is breakfast followed by a walk and a reflection. Finally, in summer 2016 we added a fourth Sunday event, Quiet Church, a five o'clock service with contemplative prayer.

The majority of those who come to Church Without Walls have no church background at all. We don't really attract people from church backgrounds. That's great and what church should be about of course, but it has its issues. Despite getting 40 or 50 people to most meetings, we don't have a solid church, because - apart from our small leadership team - people are very new to faith and to the ideas around I haven't even touched the Old Testament in three years, because we're only just getting people on to ideas about Building a sustainable church community is slower and harder if people are starting on a blank sheet...







