48 YEARS AGO!!!!

CYCLING NORTH WALES - By now, you are probably thinking this excursion has gone on long enough, but honestly, it didn't seem long enough last summer, when Hugh (Mirams) and I were doing the round of North Wales.

The tale had got as far as Anglesey. Well, we only stayed at Rhosneigr one night because time, as I said, was just flying and we had to be getting on home. We planned just to get on down the coast road, somewhere around Conway or Colwyn, we'd camp a night, and spend one last night somewhere on the Welsh side of Chester.

However, plans were made to be broken, and because Anglesey is so flat and monotonous, we only pushed it as far as Penmaenmawr. We had left quite late anyway. After camping at a nice site under the towering granite cliffs we set off into rain, rain, and more rain.

The weather this day was very depressing, but we were getting into the country that we both knew now and the scenery was more varied.

Our hemlines were high as well as our spirits for we cycled through Colwyn Bay down in the pouring rain, wearing shorts and capes. This way we kept our trousers quite dry, but ooh, it did little for the crazy Englishman's image: the school (famous, ain't it!) there was out for dinner and did we get some strange looks!!!

By now we had decided that we just had to have another day, or two, in the wilds. So we camped again at Rhyl, intending still to camp nearer Chester and make the closing stages of the ride very easy. We had terrible trouble, however, finding a camping site near Rhyl. All of those near the front would only take family parties and the one we eventually found was almost five miles inland and was being closed by the Council the next day!

The weather hit at us again the next day; that would be the Friday after August Bank Holiday. We just mounted our faithful steeds and headed in the general direction of Cheadle Hulme. We were going to camp at Chester but we got there for dinner, so we just kept on going into the rain and had dinner much later, near Northwich. Of course there was little point in not finishing the job started so we carried on until we got home, at about dusk. That meant that Rhyl to home, some 80 miles, had been completed, with a stop for dinner in about 8 and a half hours; and with full packs. This was the best timing taken during the whole distance.

If the first half of the journey was plagued by punctures, the second half was plagued by broken spokes - 12 in one wheel (max 48) by the time I arrived home at Heald Green.

FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT 2017

Thank you to everyone who supported me in any way over fair-trade fortnight, both the coffee morning and afternoon tea were very well attended and enjoyed by all (I hope!)

I have been able to send £375 to Tradecraft Exchange (50% up on last year!) to help with

their FIVE campaign which supports small farmers in Africa. The farmers are struggling to grow their crops now because of changes to formerly predictable weather patterns; they can no longer rely on the rains coming when they used to.

Traidcraft are giving them training on terracing their land to conserve water, advice on more drought resistant varieties of crops and how to diversify into growing a wider variety of crops. Also, access to more accurate weather forecasts so that they can time their planting for when the rains do come.

Every pound makes a difference to someone's life, which then impacts on their families and the wider community, so thank you again on their behalf.

An estimated 3 million men, women and young people in 170 countries and islands will have prayed with and for the people of the Philippines. In the British Isles alone some 6000 services will have been held.

We had a lovely service arranged by Christine from the Methodist Church and concluded by all joining hands around the church for the blessing.

We sang a lovely song for justice for people in need and oppressed and here is a prayer from Amos 5: 24 for this.

"Let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream".

Phillipino Mini Muffins with Coconut (These muffins were made for after the service and were delicious.)

100g softened butter

100g caster sugar

2 eggs

Tin (397g) condensed milk ½ teaspoon vanilla extract 200g dessicated coconut 80g plain flour

This mixture makes 48 mini (or 24 ordinary) muffins.

Pre-heat oven to 350F (180C, gas 6). Mix together butter and sugar, beating until fluffy. Add eggs, beating continuously. Add condensed milk and vanilla extract, mix well. Combine flour and coconut and stir into mixture. Put into mini muffin cases and bake for 15 to 20 minutes until golden.

CHRISTIAN AID 50th WALK

The Christian Aid Sponsored Walk in Cheadle Hulme will be 50 this year. If say 100 people /yr, averaged 8 mile each, that's over 40 000 Cheadle Hulme miles walked!

I clearly remember completing the first walk organised by Jack Gerrard in May 1968, 25 miles and being sponsored per mile. A sea of mainly teenagers led by our then minister, Amos Cresswell, set off from one Saturday afternoon, walking down Station road to the path near the railway station. We walked to Bramhall Park via the seven arches, up Jackson's Lane and onto the canal at High At Bollington Methodist Church we were provided with tea and sandwiches, then we continued via Prestbury, with a further stop for refreshments and onto Handforth in the dark, along the A34 and down Turves road, arriving back at church late evening. Jack continued to organise the event for more than 30 years, assisted by his wife Phyllis who organised soup and other refreshments and a band of willing volunteers. Over the year the walk has been modified, for many years walkers were transported by bus to Higher Poynton to the start of the walk then completed one or two laps of Lyme Park. Although the number of walkers have dropped over the years we have continued to raise many thousands of pounds for Christian Aid. We now offer the choice of three new routes introduced in 2016, to cater for all ages and walking abilities [and considering safety], all starting and finishing at St Martin's Church, Shrigley Rd N, Hr Poynton, SK12 1TE. The 3 & 6 mile walks along the Macclesfield canal in the direction of Marple and back to St Martins along the Middlewood Way, are gentle and suitable for buggies and scooters. The 8 mile route is a circuit around beautiful parts of Lyme Park, passing the Cage, the Lantern and Paddock Cottage, through woods and meadows. All the routes are well signposted, there are marshalls to guide you and we give all walkers a map. Well behaved dogs are also welcomed as walkers. To date our youngest 'walker' was under one and the oldest over 90. Walkers register at St Martin's Church between 10~11 am on the day. forms will be available for those planning to ask for sponsorship or alternatively we ask

walkers to make a donation on the day to Christian Aid. Further information about the walk, the three routes and sponsorship forms will be on the Christian Aid notice board at church.

To ensure the walk runs smoothly and as we offer three routes, we need a considerable number of helpers on the day, people to put up and take down the route signs, act as marshalls, help at St Martin's with registration and making refreshments. Please could you offer to help for a couple of hours?

Each year we aim to raise as much as we can through the various events we organise like the walk, the swim and the street collection, as well as the annual house to house collection. This year the Christian Aid committee have signed up to support a matched funded Christian Aid project in the the Congo. vou may recall 'Communication Matters' in last month's magazine. If we can raise £5000 by 2017, this will be matched funded by the EU and give Christian Aid £20000. The money from the house to house collection cannot be included so we can only use money raised through the events we organise like the walk. Please could you support Christian Aid though sponsoring a walker, and if you are able to gift aid any donation you give that would bring in even more money for this project.

Please could you note the date of the walk this year, **Saturday 13th May,** and consider what you could do, walking, helping with the walk on the day or sponsoring a walker?


The taxi
