St Luke - a doctor with 'good news'

This month we remember St Luke (18 October), the author of the third gospel and of the Book of Acts. Throughout his writing Luke makes clear that the good news of salvation is available to all people regardless of their gender, social position, or nationality. It is believed that Luke was a doctor, and he certainly sees the importance of healing in the ministry of Jesus and the Church. The signs of the presence of God's kingdom include the healing of sickness, hurts, as well as unforgiveness.

This is evident when Jesus sends out the 72 disciples in Luke 10; a reading for St Luke's Day:

'The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field... When you enter a town and are welcomed, eat what is set before you. Heal the sick who are there and tell them, 'The kingdom of God is near you." (Luke 10:2,8).

What challenges do we find in these verses?

Firstly Luke, as a *Gentile* (a non-Jew) recognises the revolutionary way outsiders are welcomed into the faith community, e.g. Zacchaeus (Luke 19) and Cornelius (Acts 10). How can we engage with those who are outside the community of faith? We have to avoid the tendency to regard ourselves as insiders! As we reach out to those who are ready to welcome the gospel, we have an opportunity to share good news and healing in the name of Jesus.

Secondly, as an *Evangelist*, Luke wants us to share the love of Jesus with all those we encounter. However, as these verses indicate, this has got to be rooted in prayer, if we are going to be led by God in our response to others. *'Mission is seeing what God is doing and joining in'* (Rowan Williams).

NEW CHAIR FOR CHRISTIAN AID

The Rt Rev & Rt Hon Dr John Sentamu, the former Archbishop of York, will be the next Chair of the board of international development agency Christian Aid.

Dr Sentamu, who has been outspoken on issues of poverty and justice in the UK and globally for many years, served as the Archbishop of York from 2005 until 2020. He was created by Her Majesty the Queen, Baron of Lindisfarne in the County of Northumberland and Masooli in the Republic of Uganda. He is a member of the UK Parliament, in the House of Lords.

Born in Kampala, Uganda, Dr Sentamu will be the first person of African descent to take up the position of Chair in Christian Aid's 75-year history.

Dr Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury and current Chair, will stand down at Christian Aid's Annual General Meeting (AGM) in November, having served two full terms of office.

Announcing the appointment today, Christian Aid's CEO Amanda Khozi Mukwashi said: "This is wonderful news for Christian Aid. Dr Sentamu brings with him a passion and energy for global justice, a deep love of the Church and a profound theological understanding that will be able to speak into the crises of climate change, Covid, conflict and debt that are affecting the world's poorest communities. We look forward to welcoming him to the Christian Aid family."

We are. in commemorating a life well lived and well loved. All Tom's upbringing and National Service you will remember for yourselves, I feel sure, and be thankful for all that he gave. Moreover, you will rejoice that it all brought Tom to Cheadle Hulme where he met his dearest soul mate Moira, and the subsequent sixty years (as they say) were a blessed history. 1954 to 2015 were the years they travelled together this earthly pilgrimage, for better or for worse - - - for richer or for poorer. Thank the Lord for all of that. God is good.

I was fortunate to know Tom (and Moira) for a good number of years. When I was called to be the minister at Swann Lane and Ladybridge Road in the year 2000, I began as I meant to go on by visiting in turn the whole of the congregation in these parts, and I believed the fairest way was to do it in alphabetical order. So it was that the surname 'Clarkson' came almost immediately onto my radar, and I have never regretted the afternoon I spent, competing (and failing) in the game of crazy garden golf around the back of Buckingham Road. That address became a haven of Christian comfort for a new minister, and the more so when I met and married Linda my own soul mate. Moira and Tom were always the very model of Christian love and welcome to us both, and for that I give thanks.

Thanks, Tom, good friend and fellow pilgrim, for showing us something of what God requires of his faithful, and for leaving us with more than a glimmer of the faith which Jesus had in his heavenly Father. **Go well, and REST IN PEACE. Amen.**

TRAIDCRAFT EXCHANGE

Dear Morag, It has been a few months since the Regenerators Appeal wrapped up and we've been hard at work totting up the final total. Thanks to amazing supporters like you, we have reached a final total £1,312,585 including £656,292 of match funding from the UK government, to help people on the front line stand strong in the face of climate change.

People like Issa, in Tanzania. You might remember his story from the start of the appeal. We think it's worth repeating. In Issa's village they don't ask *'is climate change real?'*

They ask: 'how will I feed my family now that the floods have destroyed my farm?' As he explains, it wasn't always like this: "In my time when I was growing up, these changes had not happened. Back then the seasons went through without any problem. People here knew exactly what to do because the weather was stable."

But the certainty of his childhood is long gone. Climate change means that the coastal region's once predictable weather is now erratic, and harvests have suffered. An unpredictable cycle of floods and droughts mean that farming in his community barely turns a profit.

"The last rainy season, there was a lot of water and the river flooded. Some of the villagers lost their animals and their houses were destroyed - we had to find a boat to rescue them."

Climate change is happening right now, and it's hitting the most vulnerable the hardest. Thanks to your support of the Regenerators appeal, people like Issa can begin the fight back.

Issa's village can now receive training in climate-resilient agriculture, forest protection and invest in tech such as solar panels.

With all this, delivered through our teams in Tanzania, the Regenerators can make that first step towards turning the tide and make sure their community can stand strong in the face of the changing climate. Once again, thank you.

ANNA CHAPLAINS

These days there seems to be a day for everything, including the United Nations' 'International day for Older Persons', which is observed on 1 October. So perhaps October is a good month to think about meeting the needs of older people in church.

Many churches employ children's workers or youth leaders – but how many have appointed people to minister specifically to the older people in their congregation and beyond?

In St Albans, north of London, two Methodist churches have joined together to recruit an 'Anna Chaplain' to help meet the needs of seniors in local church congregations and beyond.

The new role is part of a growing network of <u>Anna Chaplains</u>, named after the widow, Anna, who appears in Luke's gospel as a good role model of a faithful older person.

The development comes as charities that work with older people have published research which how badly the pandemic has impacted those aged 60 and above, and raised questions about how well they will 'bounce back' after Covid-19.

Age UK has called on the Government to give the NHS and social care services extra resources to help older people make the best possible recovery. With coronavirus now hopefully in retreat in the UK, the charity has also appealed to the wider public to keep supporting the older people in their lives.

It said: "The impact of the pandemic on the health and wellbeing of some older people in early 2021 is so demonstrably severe that it raises big questions over whether they will be able to 'bounce back'."

Against this background, Maggie Dodd, the first *Anna Chaplain* in Hertfordshire, explained: "Our vision is that older people are cherished and supported within their church communities, and also beyond, in the wider community.

"Often you have people who used to attend church, and they've become a little more frail and not able to attend or they've moved to a care home or sheltered housing, and they just lose touch with what's going on. They're not able to take themselves to church anymore."

The work of *Anna Chaplains* includes ministry in care homes and other settings where older people live or gather. At this time of year, some churches organise 'holiday at home' projects and activities for seniors in their area.

Anna Chaplains are a ministry of the BRF (Bible Reading Fellowship) charity, who have a vision "to see an Anna Chaplain in every small and medium-sized community in the country, and for the Anna Chaplain name to become synonymous with spiritual care for older people."

OUTREACH: RENEW STOCKPORT

As mentioned at the end of the last article the 'outreach' work for me has now moved to working with like minded people of Faith on what is known as the 'movement for recovery'

This is a group of interdenominational Christians who have started to work together at the behest of Andy Burnham the Mayor of Greater Manchester. Andy, along with many Civic leaders has realised that the faith community has helped extensively through the Covid crisis and has asked the minister he knows, Ian Rutherford, to co-ordinate what the faith sector does.

I was invited to become involved through Adrian Nottingham, the current Major of Stockport, and Steve Hough, who was the Baptist minister at Chelwood, and preached at our church a few times. He is also a trustee at the foodbank and a Christian charity called **Renew Stockport**.

The themes that we are trying to demonstrate that we can contribute to as churches are;

Food poverty
Homelessness
Wellbeing
Digital inclusion

Housing Mental health Loneliness

Debt

Climate

If we look at the activities across our own church we could demonstrate we do 'things' that help in most or all of these areas.

- .Donations from CHURC go to the food bank
- .We run coffee mornings for specific causes such as Mary's Meals
- .Our willingness to talk and spend time with people

collectively helps with mental health, wellbeing and often loneliness

- .The building of websites and content can play on the digital agenda
- .The conversations and posters we display around climate increase awareness

To name some, and I am sure between us we could point to many other activities that are undertaken by the church collectively or by individuals within and connected to the church that support assisting 'society' on those seven themes.

The piece of work I have agreed to do, based on the work and knowledge I gleaned working with CHURC is to think about the digital theme and a combination of what we can 'report' that churches do and how we can make the activities we do that support communities 'commissionable' by local authorities through the taxes we all pay.

This will probably form the basis of the next article as I am actively working on the plan now!!


