Advent

Waiting is not popular in our culture, when so much can be obtained simply at the press of a button! Advent, when we wait for the coming of Christmas, is also an opportunity to learn what it means to be waiting for the promised return of Jesus. He says: 'It's like a man going away: he leaves his house and puts his servants in charge, each with their assigned task, and tells the one at the door to keep watch. Therefore, keep watch because you do not know when the owner of the house will come back' (Mark 13:34-35).

We live between Jesus' first and second comings and this parable reminds us of the need to watch and wait, as disciples living faithfully for Him. It reminds us of two kinds of waiting: passive and active. Imagine you're at the railway station, awaiting the arrival of a train. On the platform a man is asleep, as he thinks there is plenty of time before the train arrives. He is passively waiting. There is also a small boy on the platform who is excited about the train coming. He can't sit still and constantly looks down the track to see if the train is coming. He is actively waiting, for he expects the train to arrive at any moment.

Advent gives us a choice: how will we wait for Jesus' coming? Passive waiting doesn't require much attention on our part. We can live our Christian life preoccupied with our own concerns, rather than looking to God. However, active waiting involves an eager expectation, as we await Jesus' return or simply look to him coming to us today. All we want is to be found faithful as His disciples. There is nothing more important than being ready to meet our Master!

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NEW MINISTER FOR DIGITAL WORSHIP

The Rev Andy Braunston, Minister of Barrhead, Priesthill, Shawlands and Stewarton United Reformed Churches (URC) in the National Synod of Scotland's Southside Cluster, has been appointed as the new Minister for Digital Worship.

The new role was introduced at General Assembly in July by the Rev Dr John Bradbury, General Secretary of the URC, to make the Daily Devotions and Daily Devotions Sunday service an integral part of the life and witness of the denomination.

The Devotions began as a personal initiative of Mr Braunston and now reach about 4,000 people daily. More than 1,500 people access the Daily Devotions Sunday Service each week, a further initiative that started as a result of people being unable to attend church during the pandemic.

As part of his role, Mr Braunston will develop a range of digital worship ministries for the URC and continue and extend the Daily Devotions and Daily Devotions Sunday Service formats. He'll also explore how new forms of discipleship development, for individuals and congregations, might be fostered to supplement the Daily Devotions initiative, and support the work of the Worship Reference Group to ensure that URC makes easily available a wide range of quality worship resources for the work of the whole Church.

Andy's role is full-time and sits in the URC's Discipleship team. It will be home-based with support from the URC's Communications Team.

Speaking about the appointment, the Rev Adrian Bulley, Deputy General Secretary (Discipleship) said: "I'm thrilled by Andy's appointment to this post. By dedicating time and resources to this pioneering ministry, the URC is recognising the importance of Daily Devotions and the Daily Devotions Sunday Service in supporting and developing discipleship and enabling faith development. The post will help those initiatives to develop and expand in new ways. Andy will bring his energy, enthusiasm and entrepreneurial flair to the role and become a valuable addition to the discipleship team."

Andy added: "I am honoured to be appointed to this role and am looking forward to developing the Devotions and the Sunday services to make them ever more useful tools of discipleship."

'COP26 FAILED' SAY CHURCH LEADERS

The Rev Clare Downing, Moderator of the General Assembly of the URC, joins with leaders from the Baptist Union of Great Britain and the Methodist Church in Great Britain in responding to the conclusion of the COP26 summit held in Glasgow.

Significant new statements have been made at the summit in Glasgow. Most government delegations accept that the sense of urgency is greater than it was six years ago at Paris, but ultimately, the summit has not delivered. All governments must agree on the necessary actions to avoid 1.5 degrees of warming. The failure of all parties at COP26 to unequivocally support this higher ambition with funding and emission reductions is an injustice towards those whose livelihoods have already been devastated by climate change.

We are deeply disappointed that the language on phasing out coal was weakened at the last moment, although the summit has called for the phasing out of 'inefficient' subsidies for fossil fuels. COP26 has also initiated a process to create a fund to help communities recover from loss and damage resulting from severe climatic events. These developments are crucial and welcome, but we cannot wait for pledges to be reviewed and turned into action every five years. Action must be taken now. The pace and intensity of action must keep up with the science and with the realities experienced by an increasing number of people whose flourishing now and in the future - depends on the actions that we all take today.

Many of our church partners in developing countries are already experiencing the dire impact of changing weather patterns on livelihoods and food security. As he arrived as a delegate at COP26, the Revd James Bhagwan, General Secretary of the Pacific Council of Churches, said that for many in the Pacific Islands Psalm 137 with its reference to being 'by the rivers of Babylon ...' has particular As these communities face exile resonance. they experience a sense of loss of identity. sovereignty, and future. At COP26, Churches have listened to and sought to amplify the voices of those in the global south who are critically affected by loss through changing

Our Churches acknowledge that while we live in

an age of individuality and immediacy, this is a journey not of individuals but of a community: the people of God and the people of the earth. Whilst individual actions are important, this is a journey that requires us to work together to build a safe and healthy future for all. The involvement of so many sectors of society in COP26 was an inspiration. Sadly, the response of governments is not yet adequate, and we call for further actions that respond meaningfully to the magnitude of the emergency that we face.



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


