Palm Sunday

It must have been a dramatic sight on Palm Sunday when Jesus approached Jerusalem to the adulation of the crowds. The Bible tells us that 'A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of Him and those that followed shouted, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" (Matthew 21:8,9).

But not everyone in Jerusalem welcomed Jesus; in the very next verse we read, 'the whole city was stirred and asked, "Who is this?" (10). But by the end of the week, the crowds had turned against Jesus and were demanding His crucifixion. (Matthew 27:22).

Why did they turn against Jesus so quickly? Perhaps they were disappointed because He refused to fulfil their expectations in establishing a new political kingdom. Instead, He came to change our hearts and save us from our sins by His death and resurrection. As He said during that week, 'My kingdom is not of this world.' (John 18:36). This deeply disappointed those who hoped that He would throw out the hated Roman occupiers.

Where would we have been on that first Palm Sunday? *Among the disciples who welcomed Him or among the sceptical crowds?* It's easy to judge those who condemned Jesus, but would we have acted differently? We too can be disappointed when Jesus fails to meet our hopes and expectations of Him?

The message of Easter is that God still loves and accepts us, and because of Jesus we can be forgiven. He came for one simple reason: 'For Christ also suffered once for sins...to bring you to God.' (1 Peter 3:18). May we welcome Jesus afresh into our lives this Eastertime.

DAVID CUTTER WILLIAMS

David was born in Cheadle Hulme, the youngest of four – himself, Robert, John and Nora. He lived there all his life and saw many changes: when he was just a lad, Cheadle Hulme was semi-rural – Orrishmere was still a farm – as were the other farms, where housing estates and new roads have now taken over.

David attended William Hulme's school, where his father was a senior master. On leaving school, he entered into an apprenticeship with motor dealers, Joseph Cockshoots in Manchester, to train as a motor mechanic. Later, he enjoyed a successful career as Service Manager with Vantage Garages in Timperley, until he retired in his Fifties in order to look after Penny and Viki.

In his younger days, David enjoyed hill walking, mountain climbing, badminton and His other great passion was singing. He was a member of the East Cheshire Operatic, at a time when the regular output was Gilbert and Sullivan. He also sang with the Poynton Male Voice Choir for many years, performing some of their solo items in concerts. A large part of David's life was spent in and around amateur theatre - beginning with Players Theatre in 1961, becoming President in 1985, and later with the Greater Manchester Federation where he also became Chairman.

It was during his time with East Cheshire, that David met Viki - he asked her out and they eventually married. Life changed forever when daughter Penny was diagnosed with MS and within 3 years, Viki was also diagnosed with MS and David became a full-time carer. With characteristic energy, David threw himself into the support of Stockport branch of the MS Society, eventually becoming its chairman.

David looked after both Penny and Viki at home, until Penny's condition deteriorated and he conceded very reluctantly that she go into a care home in the late 1990's. Similarly, it was a very sad day for David when Viki moved into care in Bowerfield Court in 2007. Sadly, Penny passed away in 2003 within the

year following her wedding to Andrew. Viki remained in Bowerfield care home until her passing in January 2015. Perhaps the climbing, the lacrosse and Badminton, the lifting and moving of Penny and Viki at home had taken its toll on David so that in time his lovely light began to wane and his own physical condition began to decline.

He had achieved so much in his work, and within the Societies and institutions he supported. He was an elder of this church and sang in the choir - all this carried out for the most part with a cheerful disposition and a wicked sense of humour. He was loyal and generous to those he loved creating a good family life for himself, Viki and Penny with complete devotion in their last years.

He could also be very persuasive and dealing determined. In with difficult situations. he was fearless. In Robert's words: David in whatever he did was wholehearted in his efforts. He knew how to serve and hated poor service, often with vigour. He knew what he thought ought to happen and fought to achieve it. His hatred of the digital world he made very evident, but he always found a way through. His support for Penny and Viki ruled his life for so long but he never lost heart, and never forgot to thank everybody who helped him in any way.

CALL FOR IMMEDIATE END TO WAR

In this season of Lent, the Rev Dr John Bradbury, General Secretary of the United Reformed Church (URC), the Revd Clare Downing, Moderator of the URC General Assembly, along with 18 other URC representatives join 300 delegates at the Churches Together in England (CTE) Forum in calling for an immediate end to the war in Ukraine.

CTE Forum is the broadest gathering of churches and Christian organisations in England, gathering 52 national member churches, Christian organisations and intermediate ecumenical bodies. Meeting at The Hayes in Swanwick from 14–16 March, the Ukrainian crisis was an urgent priority alongside its planned programme considering 'Reconciling Hope — A Broken Church for a Broken World'.

The Presidents of CTE and the Fourth Presidency Group made this statement on behalf of the whole of Forum:

"As 300 delegates from 52 national Member Churches, numerous Christian organisations and ecumenical bodies from across England, we call for the immediate cessation of hostilities, the withdrawal of invading forces and the observance of the Geneva Conventions.

In this holy season of Lent, we call upon churches everywhere to campaign for an immediate end to the war in Ukraine, and to proclaim the dignity of every human life, whatever its nationality.

We welcome and commend the extraordinary efforts of countries neighbouring Ukraine in receiving refugees from the war and call on the UK and the whole of Europe to follow their example. We support every measure to protect the most vulnerable.

We commit ourselves to pray for the nations of Russia and Ukraine, our own Government and people, and for all who find themselves refugees, or bereaved, wounded or destitute. May Christ have mercy upon our world."

PARTNERSHIP VACANCY

The 15 representatives of the Steering Grp, acting as the vacancy committee, and including me, interviewed **Rev Kurauone Mitimwii** by video link from Zimbabwe and decided to invite him to 'preach with a view'. The Synod and Church House helped with arrangements and he arrived on 15 MAR.

So on Thurs 17 Mar, 12 members of this church met Kurauone and Nancy his wife at a meet and greet in our new coffee lounge. On Sun 20 MAR we watched him preach at Altrincham URC through a less than flattering video link; a 2nd 'preach with a view' will be at Macclesfield on Sat 26 at 3pm. All are invited to go there in person, or come to church to see him, again on screen.

Kurauone is well qualified and leads 3 Presbyterian churches in in Zimbabwe. He told us on Thurs he has been to Britain before a few years ago and even came to Manchester. He has an accent which you kind of get used to - his wife Nancy is very bubbly early year's teacher and took an interest in our pre-school.

After the 2 'preach with a view' services, a church meeting could then decide to 'call' the minister. In this case 1 church meeting is called in 5 places so the ~800 members of this Partnership can decide to 'call' him. It will be a simple paper ballot, the slips being sealed and taken for counting centrally (75% needed) after the last meeting. The chair of each meeting will be an independent convenor of a Steering Group.


