Christian Basics - No 12: the Return of Jesus

'For the grace of God has appeared that offers salvation to all people... while we wait for the blessed hope, the appearing of the glory of our great God and Saviour, Jesus Christ' (Titus 2:11,13-14).

Advent is the time when we focus on the first and second coming of Jesus. He first came as a baby in Bethlehem as our Saviour, 'to redeem us from all wickedness and to purify for himself a people that are his very own.' (14), through His cross and resurrection. Now we wait for His return to judge the world and finally put an end to sin and death.

We can understand the relationship of these two events by considering D Day and VE Day in World War 2. D Day marked the allied invasion at the beaches of Normandy on 6th June 1944. It was not the end of the war, but it was a decisive turning point in which victory was assured, although not finally achieved until VE Day on 8th May 1945.

For us, Jesus' death and resurrection marks our D Day, when He secured victory over sin and death. However, only when He returns, will Jesus finally end sin and death and all who have put their trust in Him can share the great victory celebration in heaven.

In Advent we reflect on what it means to live in the time between these key events. Paul says, we need to 'to say "No" to ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright and godly lives in this present age' (12). More troops died in the period between D Day and VE Day than during the rest of the war. Although we live under Christ's victory, we will still struggle with sin and suffering.

CALL TO RAISE BENEFITS

The President of the Methodist Conference, the Revd Canon Graham Thompson, has joined a call for the Government to affirm its commitment to ensuring benefits rise in line with inflation.

Along with the **Rev Fiona Bennett**, Moderator of General Assembly, United Reformed Church, and the Rev Lynn Green, General Secretary, Baptist Union of Great Britain, he points out:

"The social security system should prevent families from being pushed into hardship, yet foodbanks are facing rapidly rising demand and almost half of claimants receiving Universal Credit report skipping meals to make ends meet.

"The value of benefits has declined for the last decade and already an average family of four relying on Universal Credit will be £1,400 worse off this winter than last – despite the interventions already put in place. Against this background it would be outrageous to erode benefits further."

OUTREACH UPDATE

The Lord charges each of us to take the word of God out into our community, to spread the Good News. This is part of our OUTREACH.

Cheadle Hulme United Reformed Church is small, but we do our best, indeed we punch a little above our weight. The church meeting has thrice voted to fund an outreach worker, currently DON Philips, and twice voted funds for a software program. Called HUBSPOT, this will record, store and track information and initiatives of churches and the faith community.

Whilst we have looked across Stockport, Cheadle Hulme churches were an early target and indeed CHELWOOD (Baptist) FOODBANK is beginning to form a nucleus.

Information-figures-statistics-DATA is king in this day and age and this is emerging now from the work Don is doing with Hubspot. It enables us to talk with authority to people like the council, it is used for reports and features in applications for grants and the like. IT IS

EVIDENCE.

Here at Swann Lane our Outreach also includes harvest donations delivered half to Chelwood and half to Lifeshare (~homeless charity in Manchester). We also open with a Warm Space every Tues 11am~2pm, but also welcome people 2 Saturdays a month at our coffee mornings. Warm Spaces is now supported by Churches Together in Cheadle Hulme who cover all the days of the week.

Bramhall and Cheadle Hulme are in the top 5% of affluent communities in the country. (Britain the top 2% in the world!) We are very lucky. Brinnington is in the bottom 5%, which makes Stockport a very polarised town.

Using the information from the database wielded by Don, we can now say that 139 families are supported with food, the largest has 8 children. The foodbank has extended to other supermarket items... half of the families take toiletries. Also needed are a range of cleaning materials and pet food. Yes, pets have become important over the pandemic as a relief for mental stresses.

In responding to need, Chelwood is launching a bed store in January. They are also wondering about the Warm Spaces initiative. Consequently they have changed the name to "Chelwood Foodbank Plus".

Though independent from the Trussell Trust (which runs 66% of foodbanks in UK), Chelwood Foodbank has other branches in Stockport, at Edgeley and Brinnington. They run the Olive Branch outreach cafe in Edgeley village and have just bought (with the help of a grant) the premises next door to distribute the food items and have flat(s) upstairs for refugees or homeless 'tenants'. Of the 139 families mentioned above, 57 in Brinnington, 43 in Adswood and 30 in Edgeley, together.

All these people at Chelwood and the Olive Branch couldn't do it without the support of the churches, especially in Cheadle Hulme. BUT, as well as financial and food support, the deprived areas of our community also need our prayers. Please pray for all families that are short of our basic facilities we take almost for granted. Please pray for all volunteers that work for the less fortunate in society.

GIFT FOR DEMENTIA

Christmas time, with its music and traditions, offers "a special gift" to people living with dementia. Christmas can act as a powerful reminiscence therapy, especially for Christian believers, who will have long term memories of past Christmases, even though their short-term memory (working memory) has faded.

So says Louise Morse, a cognitive behavioural therapist and author of several books about dementia (Lion Monarch and SPCK) and old age. So, this Christmas she is urging families who have someone with dementia to use those long-term memories and help a loved one who is suffering memory loss.

Louise Morse explains: "Reminiscence therapy helps us recall the past as a means of owning it, and strengthens a sense of self. Grandma may have only a tenuous grasp of herself in the present, but in the past, she knew who she was – and therefore, still is."

The effect of music on the brain is well known, and so Louise Morse urges that traditional Christmas music can play a big part here. She quotes a line from the hymn 'O Holy Night', when 'the soul knows its worth.' She says: "And bound up in Grandma's memories of Christmas will be worship. Worship unites us with God, and we enter into His peace."

Louise Morse also advises other music. "There are also the popular songs Grandma would have heard in her day, like Bing Crosby's 'White Christmas'. Perhaps record a selection and play them through wearable earphones. Also, don't be surprised if she 'time-travels' temporarily to a familiar place in the past!

If this happens, "don't ask them, 'do you remember?' or even say, 'I remember when,' because it will challenge and disturb your loved one. Instead, when showing family photographs or memorabilia to them, simply frame the memory with enthusiasm and warmth by saying, 'that was the day our Kevin' Or 'this came from Aunt Mabel when ...'

"Let the rhythms and music of Christmas do their work."

ECO TIPS ~ DECEMBER

At the next Management, Elders' and Church meetings we will be considering a resolution to commit to working towards **Eco Church** status. In the meantime, here are a tips from the 6R's (Refuse, Reduce, Re-Use, Repair, Re-think, Recycle)

Reduce: If you have to drive, for example visiting family or friends over Christmas, try to use energy efficient driving. Most cars have a setting that tells you how many mpg or mpkWh your journey takes. Challenge yourself to reduce Advice on energy efficient driving techniques can bе found a t https://energysavingtrust.org.uk/advice/efficientdrivina.

Re-use: Many parcels sent out now are packed with brown paper rather than bubble wrap; this can be ironed and reused as wrapping paper, personalised for the recipient with paint, stickers, etc. If you need to make a lot wrapping paper the old favourite of home-made stamps made from shapes cut into potatoes or ready-made stamps dipped in paint speed the process.

Re-think: Alternative presents give twice – to the recipient and the good cause they support. Many charities offer a huge variety of options from the goat (Christian Aid) to the carpenter's pack of refurbished tools (Tools with a Mission) to the new well (Practical Action) to setting someone up as a beekeeper (Embrace the Middle East) to a bicycle (All We Can). These are just examples, and besides the environmental aims by the charity of many of these gifts, giving them helps us reduce emissions involved in transporting goods. A win-win situation




