

Many types of flowers are used in churches, but during Easter, there is one that is especially loved: the Easter Lily. It is a tall, stately flower topped by large, graceful, white trumpet-shaped blooms.

While commercial bulb production of <u>Easter lilies</u> only began in the 19th century, Easter lilies make many appearances in both the Old and New Testaments, emphasising the flower's importance to Christianity. King Solomon spoke of them, and Christ referenced them, too.

These strikingly beautiful flowers are highly perfumed, with the central stamens covered in bright yellow or orange pollen. Unfortunately, the pollen can be a hazard, as it can permanently stain cloth due to chemicals it contains! For this reason, good florists and especially church flower arrangers will remove all the stamens before bringing them anywhere near church fabrics, or near to where ministers wearing white might brush against them.

It's thought that Easter lilies came to symbolise Christ because they embody purity - the trumpetshaped blooms recall the horns that heralded the resurrection of Christ. This is also why lilies are identified with the Virgin Mary, and <u>in artworks</u> depicting the Annunciation to the Virgin they are often found in the angel Gabriel's hand.

The second reason that Easter lilies represent Christ is because of their life cycle. Each one grows from a bulb that for several years has lain quietly beneath the earth, before growing tall and stately, and blossoming into magnificent flowers. What a picture of Jesus' life and resurrection!

## This month

Have a look around the church over Easter. Daffodils and Easter lilies are often displayed, because they are the first flowers of spring, when Nature is being reborn. Their life after the death of winter reminds us of the Resurrection. For we cannot imagine the death and the passion of Christ without having in mind the empty tomb, radiating hope. Christ's death has no meaning without His Resurrection.

## WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

The theme of this year's interdenominational service was "*I have heard about your faith*" prepared by the Christian women of Taiwan. On Friday 3 MAR we met together at All Saints' Church and, after a thoughtful hour together sharing in the worship, there was a welcome cup of tea and conversation.

We were part of a huge wave of prayer which circled the earth for at least 38 hours. It

began at dawn in Western Samoa and Tonga in the Pacific Ocean (when we were listening to the previous day's 6pm news) and ended at dusk in American Samoa (when we were having breakfast the following day). Isn't it amazing to be part of something so huge and what makes the Day of Prayer so special.

Each year the service is written by the Christian women of a different country. This year it is the turn of Taiwan, a country that has for many years been caught in a superpower struggle. It has been isolated internationally for decades and, as of April 2022, only 13 of the 193 UN member states and Vatican City/Holy See have recognized Taiwan as a sovereign country.

'The People's Republic of China' continues to claim 'The Republic of China' (Taiwan) as its sovereign territory but a large majority of Taiwanese reject

reunification with China. In May 2022 China began to harass Taiwan almost on a daily basis; according to Reuters, the risk of conflict is now at its highest level for decades. The people of Taiwan are very much in need of our prayers at this time -**The Presbyterian Church of Taiwan has a special link with our NW Synod.**]

This worship service includes letters of encouragement for women who face suffering and injustice. These stories of faith focused on issues that are shared by women and girls around the world and that continue to challenge us to prayerful action.

We thank the Christian women of Taiwan for this service and pray that our response will be affirmative and constructive as we commit ourselves to positive prayerful action.

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#### THE 'ILLEGAL MIGRATION BILL'

#### Church Statements: 8 MAR23

Church Leaders from **JPIT** denominations have signed a joint statement expressing opposition to the government's new 'Illegal Migration Bill':


We are appalled by the proposals in the government's 'Illegal Migration Bill' to detain, punish and reject thousands of people seeking safety. They are completely incompatible with our Christian conviction that all human beings are made in the image of God, and are therefore inherently worthy of treatment which honours their dignity. Instead of dignity, these plans will foster discrimination and distrust, and cause immeasurable harm to people already made vulnerable by conflict and persecution. If ever there was a contemporary example of ignoring our neighbour and walking by on the other side, this is it.

When two in three people who cross the channel to seek sanctuary in the UK are granted asylum following rigorous checks, it seems unthinkable to reject them before they have even had a chance to have their claim for asylum heard. Manv people fleeing war and persecution in countries such as Iraq, Iran, Syria, Eritrea and Sudan have been left with no safe and accessible routes to claim asylum in the UK, forcing people to make difficult and dangerous decisions. The UK falls far behind our global neighbours in welcoming people seeking sanctuary into our communities, and yet these plans essentially put a ban on claiming asylum and reject the UK's responsibility to play our part in responding to global inequalities and conflict.

We all agree that we cannot continue to see thousands of people risk their lives to reach safety in the UK, but the solution cannot be deterrence and punishment. As Christians, we believe that we should be amongst the first to welcome the stranger with open arms. We urge the government to withdraw this legislation, to honour our moral and international obligations and to behave with compassion and fairness by establishing safe and accessible routes to enable the UK to play its part in welcoming people in need of safety.

"What did God say?" asked Leo.




