Spiritual Disciplines: Worship

'Yet a time is coming and has now come when the true worshippers will worship the Father in Spirit and in truth, for they are the kind of worshippers the Father seeks.' (John 4: 23).

The spiritual discipline of worship has both a personal and corporate dimension. It includes worship services as well as day-to-day activities. God is actively seeking worshippers (John 4:23) and worship is a response to our experience of God's love. The main words used of worship in the Bible have the sense of *submission* and *service*. They remind us that our lives need to be shaped by worship *on a daily basis*.

There are different ways into worship: practising stillness, offering praise (cf Psalm 95) and offering the whole of our lives as a living sacrifice (cf Romans 12:1). Worship is an act of the will; we choose to honour and please God. Depending on our circumstances, worshipping God requires effort on our part. However, entering into worship is to be transformed by His presence into the likeness of Jesus (cf 2 Corinthians 3:18).

Richard Foster in *Celebration of Discipline* offers some helpful ways in which to engage with worship on a daily basis:

Learn to practise the presence of God daily by punctuating every moment with praise and adoration Have different experiences of worship, both in large and small gatherings (i.e., small group)

Be prepared for gathered worship in heart and mind.

Be willing to let our worship transform our thinking and practice as God meets us.

Cultivate holy dependence on God for everything in our lives, looking forward to all God wants to do Learn to offer a sacrifice of worship, however we are feeling!

'Now the worship is over, let the service begin' (Bishop Michael Marshall, closing a service)

Lifeshare - Protein Tins, Porridge pots, Pot Noodles, Cereal Bars, Biscuits, Bottled Water, Chocolates, Tinned Vegetables.

ROWLEY PROJECTS

We had a great welcome as always in the primary school and

pupils were thrilled with pens, pencils and of course knickers and pants. The canvas bags were again well-received as were the printed T shirts for the sports teams and books donated by the author. We would like to 'shoe' more of the school and are sending enough money for another 50 pairs. The playground is being much enjoyed. primary school has 445 pupils and only 4 government teachers. Very sad news; Everline Banda, who has taken care of girls' welfare at Kolweny for the whole of her teaching career, has been moved to another relatively local school as deputy head. She was told one week and moved the next! We visited her at Kadie (where some years ago we built a classroom and provided plimsoles for the whole school in response to seeing bare-footed children wading through the mud.) We took all our extra knickers and sets of pens for exam candidates. The four sets of latrines at the primary school are full - yuk!! They need to be 'exhausted'. For less than the cost of one new latrine block the 'exhaust' company will come from Kisumu and empty all four blocks.

Our anticipated grand opening of the **IT Suite** at the High School was thwarted by the shoddy finishing by the builders. The building looks fantastic and the community is delighted with it but **culture clash alert!** To our community anything is better than nothing and sub-standard finishing is not a problem but to us, if we're paying a good price, we expect a good job and shoddy work is unacceptable. How can progress be made if standards aren't raised?

The trench for the irrigation of **the shamba** is being dug this month. I gave my usual 'girlie' talk to the Form 1 and Form 4 girls about self-esteem and self-confidence. It seems there's a population explosion in Kenya despite smaller families so I was asked to talk about contraception to Form 4. Talk about 'on the hoof'! I tried to explain that getting married isn't the problem, just immediate children. Every girl, 196 and more than 50% of the student population, received a pair of **knickers.** Around 95% are using mooncups ensuring attendance, saving money and not

blocking the latrines!

The dispensary is so busy the government has given Edwin an assistant Community Health Worker, Valary, but still no gloves, none in 4 years! He absolutely loves Germolene with its antiseptic properties. We replenished school first aid kits and handed over almost 1 000 paracetamol to schools.

Our long discussion with Joseph last time about reinvigorating the water filter workshop has not borne much fruit as he has been very ill. He does have a young man who helps him out, but he needs to find someone else so that he can hand over the When I suggested a woman it was snorted at but I asked if the men had ever tried lifting the water pots onto their heads - I can't even get them off the ground! There's urgent need of a filter on many compounds still. The Sunday School children at Bramhall Baptist donated a large sum of sponsorship money to buy filters so we discussed how to put this to best use. The picture still is a complaining donkey bringing barrels of diseaseridden water up from the shrinking river.

Form 4 Scholarships We are again sponsoring 7 students by giving them a laptop and paying accommodation, books and travel and to the rest we give a small bursary each year. The entry procedure is little short of shambolic. Last Monday was registration and fee-paying day and acceptance letters were still being received the previous Friday. (Exam results came out in February) Ayugi had to deal with two students in a predicament last weekend, having only just received their letters and no money for travel or to pay fees and no accommodation. Imagine us parents sending our children off into the unknown like that! He will have spent Monday at the bank transferring money to the different universities and colleges and the students will have travelled there in hope.

We took this time (along with a miscellany of other things)... Germolene, incontinence sheets (for operating and delivery beds), plasters, toothpaste 418 toothbrushes, 965 pens, 658 pencils, 670 prs knickers, 70 prs pants, 12 bags, 1,000 prs latex gloves & 2,840 paracetamol (packaging removed).

Collecting for next visit: New Knickers ages 3-4 up to size 12-14 (midi not full brief). Bras (34-36 A or B) Underpants ages 3-4 up to age 18. Toothbrushes. Mini toothpastes. Reading glasses. Paracetamol. Plasters. Germolene, latex gloves. Click top pens (Tops get lost!) Pencils with erasers.

URC AT A CROSSROADS

Introduction

In late 2021, the United Reformed Church (henceforth the URC) approached **Theos** to conduct research into the life, identity, and flourishing of the URC. The key objective of the proposed research was to provide a snapshot of the URC today, exploring its identity rooted in practice, what flourishing looks like, what resources exist or need to be sought, and what barriers there are to flourishing in the future.

The project was conceived as a partnership, reflecting Theos' belief that the proposed research, while immediately relevant to the United Reformed Church itself and the 'Church Life Review' it was undertaking, would also be of wider interest and help nuance the picture of Christianity in the UK at a time of complex change in the religion and belief landscape.

The public conversation surrounding religion and society in the UK is often dominated by recurring themes, certain namely disagreement, secularisation, and polarisation. In contrast, this review would consider the life of the church on the ground through a particular case study: the lived experience and practices local URC congregations. of including how these congregations interact with their communities, and how they are supported (or not) by the church structures of the URC.

Methodology

We adopted a mixed-methods approach to the project, with the research consisting of deskbased study, qualitative and quantitative The qualitative components. element consisted of 56 semi-structured interviews, conducted in person and online, with local church leaders and volunteers in contexts, synod staff from two representative URC synods, Church-Related Community Workers (CRCWs), and members of the URC Youth Executive, among others. 39 out of the 56 were individual (1:1) interviews, and 17 were group interviews. The size of each group ranged from 2 to 8 people. In effect, we were able to hear from over 90 individuals, across 7 synods, and at different levels of church structures and responsibility.

The local contexts chosen as case studies included single congregations, pastorates and

Local Ecumenical Projects (LEPs). Pastorates are congregations grouped together in a particular geographical area for administrative and pastoral purposes that are under the care and leadership of a single minister or team of ministers. Local Ecumenical Partnerships (LEPs) are - as the name suggests - formal partnerships in which two more denominations work together in mission and ministry at the local level. This can take a variety of forms, including shared worship services, joint outreach programs or the sharing of resources and facilities.

These locally-based case studies, along with the ones run at synod level (Yorkshire and South Western) were chosen in consultation with the project's steering group and synod moderators. The aim was to achieve, within the constraints of the project, a cross section of the denomination, capturing the shared challenges opportunities, the diversity (theological. churchmanship, and ethnic) and different levels of flourishing within the denomination.

quantitative element, developed complement the qualitative data, consisted of a short online survey sent to all URC churches. The survey gathered 402 responses, with the data providing additional insight, nuance and clarity to the picture resulting from the qualitative element of the project (in Appendix 1). We also made use of data collected through the 'Jubilee Questions', a survey run in-house by the URC to mark the denomination's 50th anniversary in 2022, which yielded 40 responses. respondents to this survey were individuals, while 37.5% of respondents completed the survey on behalf of a local church/pastorate. This phase of the research ultimately enabled direct consultation with over 30% of URC congregations across the UK.

In addition, we engaged in a limited mapping exercise, matching URC church closure data in

England, Scotland and Wales to deprivation data, the purpose of which was to ascertain whether URC churches are disproportionately closing in deprived areas. A summary of the findings can be found in Appendix 2.

Structure of the report

This report consists of three main parts. The first chapter unravels positive examples of church life and flourishing in the URC. The second examines some of the key barriers to flourishing that we identified during the research. Some of these are found at the level of local congregations, while others emerge at the level of wider church structures, including synod and other conciliar forums. The final part of the report presents a series of recommendations and possible pathways to flourishing for the URC.

LINK TO HOPE SHOEBOXES




