ISOBEL GRIEVE - MEMORIES

~Wife, Mum, Grandma, Great Grandma and friend to many.

Isobel was born in Northumberland to William and Lena on Mid-Summer day 1928, a beautiful day so her father took her into their garden in a pram he had decorated with roses that he had picked. She had an elder brother, Roy, who teased her until she grew older, when they became the best of friends.

The family returned to the Isle of Man when Isobel was two, where Roy and Isobel grew up with many cousins and aunts and visited other family on trips to Burton on Trent.

Isobel was educated in Douglas, but spent lots of time with her father in the Man countryside along with their Jack Russell and ferret. She earned extra pocket money by taking poached rabbits in a basket to the local butchers!

During the war years she helped her mother in their guest house where British officers were billeted. Isobel vividly recollected VE Day when she sneaked off with her friend to row around Douglas Bay.

After gaining her school certificate, Isobel worked in a hairdresser's until she was old enough to train as a nurse. We don't think she learned many skills working with hair years of wonky fringes on Hazel and Peter followed; when Hazel was a teenager she had a trendy feathered haircut and her mother cut all the feathers off because she erroneously thought they were mistakes by the hairdresser.

Isobel trained to be a nurse on the Island then became a midwife leaving for Birmingham. On trips home she met Angus, marrying in 1954 and became mum to Hazel and Peter.

A busy life a minister's wife supporting Angus and being involved with many groups followed. Hazel recalls her making hot-pot in a large brown pot and taking it to Church socials, on the bus! At one Church sale of

work, Hazel spent her pocket money on a trendy underskirt, which to her horror, Isobel ironed a hole in and tried to patch it by cutting up some knickers - Hazel was not amused.

Moves around the North of England ended with retirement in Cheadle Hulme in 1979, where they settled happily.

Isobel gained her son-in-law, Phil, in 1976, and daughter-in-law, Geraldine in 1989. Isobel nursed Angus throughout his long illness and then was kept busy with her four grandchildren, Richard, Andy, James and Jennifer, and her three great grandchildren, Isobel, Ellis and Rowan.

Isobel always remained close to Roy and his wife Mary, and we always enjoyed summer holidays in Devon, especially during the 1966 World Cup. Further holidays were enjoyed with her cousins from Port St Mary who would also travel across to Cheadle Hulme for family occasions.

Isobel enjoyed family time most of all. Wearing a brown furry hat which we laughed at, she would take her grandchildren on outings. On one occasion when she was visiting Hazel with young James, she got on the wrong bus and Hazel had to go to find them.

Holidays and trips in the caravan when Peter, Geraldine, James and Jen would visit us leave us with many memories. Top of the list was her thunderous snoring, which when Uncle Roy asked Richard and Andy about, they were forced to deny it happened! We visited Devon, and dropped Isobel at Roy's for a few days, Windermere, Berwick on Tweed and Derbyshire, fed for the day with a huge pot of Geraldine's chilli and a chocolate cake.

Food memories come up frequently - her ham and beef sandwiches, family barbecues in the rain, where Phil cooked, installed under a tarpaulin - 'Little Willy' sausage, crocodile chips and trifle, with specially made chocolate figures with us all sitting round the red Formica table in the kitchen.

Isobel loved meals out, and could be found with a sherry or glass of wine and was once found with a tequila slammer – James and Jen leading her astray, again!

Her 80th birthday party was celebrated in style by taking a surprise helicopter trip over Derwent reservoir. Isobel's 90th birthday was spent at Swann Lane with a party held, again with all the family.

We have happy memories of a family get together in Little Longstone in 2016 where she was pushed to and back from the pub by James (with much laughter).

Although Isobel's last years were difficult for her, she was able to live in her own flat until she needed full time care. She lived her final years in Bankfield Care Home where she still enjoyed her glass of sherry, chocolates and biscuits, leaving us at the grand old age of 95 years.

Isobel will be missed.

URC AT CROSSROADS

A culture of listening and collective discernment

Shortage of ministers

To say there is a shortage of ministers in the URC is to state the obvious. Indeed, this was a recurring complaint and source of sadness in many of the interviews we conducted. It also came through clearly in the survey we ran. The minister-to-church ratio varies from synod to synod, but in one of the synods we studied, the ratio was approximately 20 ministers to 100 churches. As one interviewee put it, "ministers are now becoming more like little bishops of a small diocese." In a similar, only half-humorous vein, a local church leader referred to this as the "bubble gum model of ministry", where ministers stretched thinner and thinner congregations. Many interviewees respondents to the questionnaire reported that the absence of a full-time minister has a negative effect on the congregational life and ministry of local congregations, limiting particularly their ability to meet the needs of their local communities through outreach activities. "Without a fulltime minister and therefore relying on a list of lay preachers it is hard to establish any sense of continuity and future progress," said a survey respondent, voicing a representative sentiment in the research.

Indeed, qualitative data from our research revealed that congregations which experience a level of flourishing have either a full-time minister or a minister who, while not strictly speaking full-time, is sufficiently embedded within and present to the congregation in order to, among other things, meet their pastoral needs and mobilise for local mission.

Dependence on ministers can be seen in the responses to the online survey we conducted. 36% of respondents (effectively 145 out of 402 churches) identified "limited ministerial support" as a barrier to thriving as a congregation. In the same question, 18 out of 402 churches selected "all of the above". "Synod cannot expect growth if it continues to say 'NO' to our requests for help personnel/hours", said a respondent to the survey.

However, we also came across congregations who, although they had not had ministers for several years, were self-reliant and resourceful. This was largely down to having "very capable elders and local leaders," as the minister who eventually came to one of the churches in

question said during our interview. "A small group of committed people can make a huge impact and can continue congregational ministry with little stipendiary support," they noted. In a similar vein, another interviewee remarked how "a group of committed people can really be an excellent witness to the community; they can keep things going, maintaining their building extremely well and nurturing the sense of fellowship."

Indeed, several interviewees were keen to stress that having a minister or a greater share of a minister's time should not be seen as a panacea. When asked whether there are "any church burdens that, if freed of, would liberate you to flourish?", a respondent to the 'Jubilee Questions' survey identified "the idea of leadership being predominantly for ordained clergy..." as a barrier which, among other things, can sometimes prevent not only members to receive Communion (because they 'Ministers of Word and Sacrament') but also to develop as mature, local leaders who can take ownership of the life, discipleship, and mission of local congregations. This points to what several interviewees described as a crisis of discipleship and leadership development throughout the denomination. More on this further below.

CALLING OUR MINISTER

Churches and Partnerships talk to their Synod about declaring a vacancy, then write a 'Profile' describing their situation. Profiles are published in the Eastern Synod website (who host this for the whole URC).

Synod Moderators meet monthly and discuss vacancies, ministers moving and students graduating, and may introduce or advise some. Applicants can consult their Moderator, and students their Principle OR, view the website and contact the declaring church /partnership.

Elders/Steering groups with a vacancy can consider the minister/student profile and then perhaps arrange a meeting (~interview). If both parties are agreed, a 'Preaching with a View' is arranged. Easy for one church, a nightmare for a partnership of 8, where video conferencing is needed.

When congregation(s) have met /seen /heard the minister/ordinand, a church meeting (or united church meetings) is/are arranged to discuss and divine if they are going to 'call' this person and a vote is organised. If 75% vote to call this applicant, the candidate makes a final decision to accept the call.

If the vote is say 80%, the minister / student may still feel that 1 in 5 don't want them and decline the call, but all being well, it leads to induction and /or ordination and a new minister joining the worship team. Yes, we are committed to 'team ministry' for the future.

This complex system has evolved to maintain confidentiality so that an existing congregation shouldn't hear that their minister wants to go.

Our Steering group, as 'Elders' of the Partnership, have been down this time consuming route several times and now present a candidate to you on 20/21st Jan, at Cornerstone/Altrincham/Bramhall.see Calendar

The Partnership, of soon to be 8 churches, is struggling courageously with only 1 minister, Kura, and though he is managing very well indeed in a new culture, he (and we) disserve a full team. We encourage you to see /witness our candidate, and please try hard to be able to vote later (members eligible) to make it representative.


