ROWLEY PROJECTS - KENYA REPORT

"We've been back 10 days but we hit the ground running with all our 'normal life' activities having already started so the report has taken a little longer than usual. I've also struggled to fit it onto 2 pages so make sure it's full screen as it's font 9.

We had an amazing trip. Thank you to those who pray for and/or think about us whilst we're away. We all stayed well despite the heat and sometimes frantic activity - no, not frantic. Nothing is frantic at that altitude -6,000 ft - but concentrated at the very least.

We set out a timetable and managed to stick to it in general with only 'African' delays such as people not turning up on time or not at all, faulty equipment, long queues oh and a presidential visit! It was really special to have two of Ayugi's daughters cooking for us and being wonderfully helpful around the place. A third daughter also paid us a visit with one of her small children, travelling some 50+ miles on the back of a motor bike. The main roads are now flat and pothole-free but off the main road and the maram is rough and takes some negotiation. I love driving the Rav 4 but it hasn't been tested in the wet yet.

We ate well - avocados from the tree the size of small rugby balls, fresh bananas, pineapple and water melon. Ayugi drove 15 miles to the nearest butchery to buy goat for a stew and his daughter brought tilapia from Lake Victoria. Lots of potatoes, rice and chapatis and wonderful puy lentil stew. Of course the water is pure and tastes wonderful straight from the filter.

The house is rat and bat -free but still houses wildlife of some sort, other than the geckos, which scrabbles about in the night in the loft. The dawn rooster choral contest continues and we might be awakened by cows munching outside the window. We often have visits from sheep and chickens in the porch. The solar worked throughout our visit a first. Things are looking up."

LEAVE THE LEAVES

Falling leaves are the first signal of the arrival of the autumn season. Many see this as an additional chore, as they would tend to rake leaves and throw piles of them away.

Then, what are you supposed to do instead? Because large heaps of leaves can cause dead grass patches in your lawn, it would be ideal to mulch them and spread them evenly across your yard. Mulched leaves can also be piled around the bases of trees or on top of flower beds and gardens. This will help insulate the soil over the winter, protecting the soil's microbial life.



If you don't want to repurpose your leaves from your lawn and are really considering removing the leaves, think of composting them instead of throwing them away. If your council does not offer a composting facility, then consider starting a compost at home. Composting bins are available from garden centres, or just make a compost pile.

Dead leaves are an important part of the natural cycles of plants and soil. Plants emerge from the soil, die, decay, and return to the soil, providing carbon that contributes to the soil ecology and encourages healthy microbial activity. The removal of dead leaves from this cycle can actually diminish the soil's health.


