### Friends, A Christmas Reflection...

'For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.' (Isaiah 9:6)

As my family and I prepare for our first Christmas here in Manchester, we are experiencing a wonderful blending of familiar traditions with the new. Old decorations bring happy memories to our new home, our children act out nativity plays with new friends, and we enjoy singing traditional carols with new congregations. While there is comfort in finding the known in a new place, I am also reminded to be open to how these familiar words sound in these streets and in this world. What am I hearing differently in this context? What is God pointing me to?

The headlines continue to be filled with news of war, corruption, and rhetoric that seeks to divide rather than unite, and yet in this ever-changing world we still gather to draw comfort from the familiar yet powerful promises of the Christmas story. The surprise of a child who, as Eugene Peterson writes, will grow up to 'say the big nouns: joy, glory, peace; and live the best verbs: love, forgive, save.'1 A radical gospel that is just as needed in these times as it was when it was first proclaimed two thousand years ago.

We all need peace this Christmas. Peace for our families when the endless list of preparations becomes too much, or tensions run high around the dinner table. Peace for those leading activities and services for others, worrying if they have overlooked something important. Peace for those experiencing grief, loneliness, discrimination, or anxiety about their circumstances. Peace for those caught in conflicts that rage around the world, especially in the land we call holy.

As we work, speak out, and pray for peace for our world this Christmas, remember to take some time to welcome the peace of Christ into your own life. As Jesus said 'Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid.' (John 14:27)

### SAFEGUARDING

What is Safeguarding and why does it matter?

We hear in the news about another case of abuse of one sort or another. They are unusual, that makes them **news**, but doesn't the media make a meal of it, producing salacious headlines. Worst of all, it especially hurts when the faith sector is involved, but itself is a reflection of much community involvement.

Bad things happen my granny would say but if we can stop any of this abuse happening at all then we must make a big effort. That's what **Safeguarding** is trying to do. The government has generated rules and guidelines to help us navigate life in a civilised society, where we respect and support one another. These are Safeguarding laws. We no longer live in caves.

The meek and mild of our communities are those at risk, usually the children, and sometimes vulnerable adults, both of whom are not always able to look after themselves.

And what are the 6 abuses? <sup>1</sup>Physical, <sup>2</sup>sexual, <sup>3</sup>emotional, <sup>4</sup>psychological, <sup>5</sup>economic, <sup>6</sup>cultural, any of which may come from any direction. The 1st is obvious - well no, it includes neglect and self harm! 2nd includes denigrating comments, even wolf whistles. 3rd, includes <u>lack of love</u> ~esp'ly children. 4th, involves mental health. 5th is loss of financial control. 6th inc gender and identity. So it's not at all straight forward, but it's often about power and control, and maybe over a period of time that wears down the victim.

Many organisations (from schools to scouts) provide graded training for employees / members, just like the URC's <u>required</u> courses: Basic (~Elders), Intermediate (secretaries) and Advanced (~Ministers and Safeguarders).

All this works because we are ALL involved; the law says you, yes **you**, **must** report abuse if you suspect it. Not sure? You must report and let those more qualified decide.

Report to who? **Our** Safeguarding lead at the moment happens to be the secretary Alison Stevens, who you can talk to. There is also a sheet in the main hall of other contacts, from the Synod, the Social services and the Police.


### MISSIONAL PARTNERSHIP


**<u>Duties</u>** are performed by a small team on a rota. Please check the board for changes.
