Being People of Safety and Solidarity this Easter

As we journey through Lent towards Easter, the gospel stories we share on Sundays highlight the many risks and dangers in discipleship. We hear again and again of the challenges the disciples went through in following Christ, and the difficult nature of the path Christ was walking in obedience to God. Think of the two who were sent to take stranger's donkey for Jesus to ride into Jerusalem, those who witnessed him being arrested in the Garden of Gethsemane, Peter being put on the spot about his allegiance to Christ, and the women who stayed with Christ at the cross when everyone



else had left him. Every step Jesus took was fraught with danger, pain, and tears. Religious, social and political power were stacked against him. It was so risky for anyone to identify with Christ.

There are many people in our communities and world that are hurting right now. Those in situations of danger who, like Christ, know rejection, oppression, persecution, and the deep pain of being abandoned by those they once trusted. This Easter let us find ways that we can be people and places of safety and solidarity in our troubled world. Through the welcome and friendship we offer, through prayer, through speaking out against injustice, and through giving what we can in time or money to support those in need. Let us be sustained and inspired by the living hope and peace of the resurrected Christ, who came and endured so much so that all may 'have life and have it abundantly' (John 10:10).

MAVIS JOY DAVIES

Mavis was born in Hastings on the 10th March 1933 to Frederick and Mildred Kennard. Fred died when Mavis was only two years old. For practical reasons, Mavis and her mother moved to live with her auntie Nora who lived in St Leonards. In 1939 they then moved to Norfolk to help another aunt look after Grandma who had had a stroke on a visit and couldn't travel back to Sussex. Mavis stayed in Shipdham, attending the local primary school and then on to East Dereham High School for girls. As a child she did a lot of cycling – there were very few cars and no public transport. From the age of 11 she had to cycle 8 miles each way to and from Her mother was a dressmaker and school. fashioned brown paper garments to wear under her gabardine in winter.

On leaving school at 16 she moved to Liverpool for further education, which was a big shock after the clean air and clear skies of Norfolk. Then on to employment as a Lab Technician for Distillers Company who were pharmaceutical manufacturers (a job of which she was very proud). When in Liverpool she met Bill at a YHA club, who she married in 1956. After two years they moved to Manchester with Bill's employment and took up residence in Cheadle Hulme. Paul and Rebecca were born here. Bill had a change of career which took them back to Liverpool and Jan was born in Rainhill in 1964. In '65 Bill took up a teaching post in Cheadle, so the family moved back and Mavis has been here ever since; first in Madison Avenue. then Moss Nook, back to Hilton Drive, and then Swann Grove, to be nearer to church. At this stage, Mavis realised she would have to give up driving due to failing eyesight.

She spent most of her retirement with John Osborne and shared his passions for gardening, Choral music and Austria. When in Austria, he introduced her to many of his friends, who have remained her own dear friends since John died. As a child in Shipdham, Mavis did all the usual things that children did in villages at that time – Child Friendly Society, British Red Cross, Girl


Guides. But her real love was campanology. Once tall enough to reach the Sally, and trained, it was twice on Sunday, 2-3 times a week in the home church and exchanges with other teams in Norfolk (lots of bells in Norfolk!). She always loved choral singing – starting aged 12 in the choir of the local parish church. Then in Liverpool in the choir of her church and finally here at Swann Lane. She also sang in Gatley Choral, the Lawrence Singers, Stockport Festival Choir and the North Wales Summer School each summer.



Her other love was working with flowers - in the garden and arranging cut flowers. Dorothy Frances Gurney says: One is nearer God's heart in a garden than anywhere else Her first experience of flower on earth. arranging was at the local church as a child when decorating churches was popular. Easter Sunday was a flower festival and the children were responsible for the windowsills, filling fish paste jars with primroses and hedgerow flowers gleaned for beforehand. Talking of hobbies, we must not forget the sewing and knitting that have kept her hands constantly busy. Friendships were very important to Mum and we are grateful to all of you for coming to celebrate her life today.

Bernie also detailed Mavis' extensive work within the church from youth work and jumble sales to flower arranging, magazine reporter to charity adviser, not to mention sewing & holding Fellowship meets at home and a thousand other roles, over years. He drew parallels with Tabitha (called Dorcas) in Acts 9 who also selflessly supported her friends. Finally, *I think* we heard her singing on a recorded blessing by The Lawrence Singers.


